

Public Service Vehicle	A motor Vehicle which carries or is intended to carry passengers for hire or reward, whether used or constructed solely for that purpose or not. Public Service Vehicles include Staff Buses, School Busses, Tour Service Vehicles, Commuter busses and Intercity and Regional Busses

1.0. INTRODUCTION

The Land Transport Regulatory Authority (LATRA) is a Government Regulatory Authority established by the Act No. 3 of 2019 (the Authority). LATRA is set to regulate commercial road, rail, cable or underground transport services. Regulated Transport Services under the LATRA Act, Cap 413 includes transport services for passengers and for goods in the aforementioned land transport modes. Operationally, the specific regulated services under the road and rail modes are defined under First Schedule of governing regulations to enforce the law; which includes intercity bus services, commuter bus services, staff bus services, school bus services, rural-urban bus services, taxi cabs, ride hailing services, ride sharing, motorcycles, motor tricycles and goods carrying vehicles. Rail transport services includes passenger services defined by classes of services such as long-range, commuter and deluxe trains as well as freight trains.

Section 5(1) (b) of the Land Transport Regulatory Act, Cap 413 directs the Authority to issue and renew road service licenses for Passenger Service Vehicles (PSV), Goods Carrying Vehicles (GCV) and Private Hire Vehicles to ensure availability of safe and quality services. Further, it follows from Section 5(g) of the Act, to prepare this statistical report of its operations in pursuit of monitoring the performance of the regulated services in terms of availability of services, quality of services and level of investment.

In enhancing availability of regulated land transport services that serve socio-economic needs of the public, the Authority targets to expand and increase the supply of transport services, transform urban transport provision; increase efficiency in provision of regulated transport services; promote regulated transport subsectors; as well as, enhancing competition among regulated suppliers. The Authority ensured operating vehicles meet service standards by issuing road transport service licenses for passenger and goods carrying units as required by respective regulations.

Therefore, this Report serves as a reference material for land transport regulatory and services performance to the Authority's stakeholders. This Annual Statistics report provides details in terms of numbers on issued licenses of regulated market of road service categories, certified drivers and vehicles fitted with Vehicle Tracking Devices during the Financial Year 2022/2023. The report further compares performance of financial year 2022/2023 against the financial year 2021/2022 to assess changes in the levels or structure of the regulated market.

1.1. ORGANISATION OF THE REPORT

The report is organized in six main sections; section 1: Introduction; Section 2: Number of issued licenses; Section 3: Issued licenses by service category; Section 4: Drivers registration and certification; Section 5: Vehicle tracking system and Section 6: Annexes.

2.0. NUMBER OF ISSUED LICENSES


Pursuant to Section 5(1) (b) of the Land Transport Regulatory Act, Cap 413 the Authority continued to issue and renew road service licenses for passenger and goods carrying vehicles to ensure they meet licensing standards. To effect this, in the financial year 2022/2023, the Authority issued a total of 284,158 road service licenses, equivalent to an increase of 18.4% compared to 239,953 licenses issued in the Financial Year 2021/2022. Summary of issued road license is summarized in Table 1 and Figure 1.

3. ISSUED LICENSES BY SERVICE CATEGORY

During the reporting period, the Authority issued licenses for Passenger service vehicles, Goods Carrying Vehicles and Private Hire Vehicles. The number of licenses issued to Public Service Vehicles (PSV) increased by 5.6 percent from 47,547 licenses issued in 2021/2022 to 50,221 licenses issued in 2022/2023. Also, PSV contributed 17.7 percent of road transport service market share in terms of operating units. Goods carrying vehicles, with a market share of 59.8 percent had increased by 18.8 percent compared to financial year 2021/2022. Further, licenses issued to vehicles providing Private Hire Services had increased by 29.6 percent between financial year 2021/2022 and financial year 2022/2023. Of the major categories of services, Private hire services contributed 22.5 percent of total licenses issued, as summarised in Table 2.



3.1. Issued Licenses to Public Service Vehicles

Public Service Vehicles (PSV)include commuter, intercity and regional bus services, Tour bus services, School bus services, Staff bus services and Short-Term service Licenses. Public Service vehicles are licensed under the Land Transport Regulatory Authority (Public Service) Regulations, GN 76 of 2020.

3.1.1. Issued Licenses to Public Service Vehicles Sub-Categories

Public service vehicles are categorized to provide road transport between two administrative towns (Intercity) or within administrative region (Regional buses). There are also license category issued to School Buses, Tours vehicles, Staff buses and Commuter buses operating within shorter distances of an urban centre.

Within PSV, Data analysis show that the largest sub-category, with 47.4 percent of issued licenses were for intercity or regional bus services. The second largest sub-categories Licenses issued to commuter buses represented 26.2 percent of all PSV licenses while the share of tour services was 10.6 percent representing fourth largest category. The least share of PSV sub-categories, with representation of 0.5 percent were short term licenses. Table 3 provides a synopsis of issued PSV licenses in the financial year of 2022/2023 and 2021/2022.

3.1.2. Issued PSV Licenses per Seating Capacity

During the period under review, the Authority issued 50,221 licenses to PSV; out of which, buses with seating capacity of up to 15 seats and those with seating capacity between 26 to 45 passengers were each represented at 34.6 percent of all PSV. Moreover, it was deduced that 91.3 percent of the licensed PSV during the reporting period had carrying capacity of 45 or less while only 9 percent had seating capacity above 45, considered large buses. Table 4 and Figure 4 provide detailed information of licensed PSV by seating capacity.

3.1.3. Issued Licenses for Intercity and Regional Buses per Class of Service

Intercity and regional bus services are further classified as ordinary class, semi-luxury class and luxury class in accordance to Regulation 22 of the Land Transport Regulatory Authority (Public Service) Regulations, GN 76 of 2020. During the reporting period, 93.1 percent of licenses issued for Intercity and Regional Buses, were ordinary class while 6.3 percent were semi luxury buses and 0.6 percent were Luxury Buses as summarized in Table 5.

3.1.4. Licenses Issued to PSV per Zone


During the period under review, number of licenses issued to the Eastern zone declined by 14.1 percent, Whilst Central Zone, Lake Zone, Northern Zone and Southern Zone recorded growth of 128.4 percent, 13.4 percent, 23.7 percent and 9.8 percent respectively. Table 6 provide details of issued PSV licenses in each administrative regions and clusters of administrative regions (zones) for financial year 2021/2022 and 2022/2023.



Further; during the financial year 2022/2023, 34.0 percent of Public Service Vehicles were issued in the Eastern zone, 27.0 percent in Northern Zone, 16.0 percent in Lake Zone, 11.8 in the Southern Zone and 10.9 percent in the Central zone of Tanzania. It was also revealed that that 61 percent of all PSV licenses were issued in Eastern and Northern zone.

Further, the number of issued PSV in all zones were concentrated in regions of major cities within each zone as demonstrated by the share of issued licenses at 70.2 percent in Dar-es-Salaam among those issued in Eastern zone while the corresponding shares for Arusha, Mwanza, Dodoma and Mbeya were 57 percent, 43 percent, 40 percent and 30 percent relative to their nearby administrative regions (zones) respectively.

3.2. Issued Licenses for Goods Carrying Vehicles

Goods carrying vehicles are licensed under Regulation 3 of the Transport Licensing (Goods Carrying Vehicle) Regulations, GN 77 of 2020. During the FY 2022/23, a total of 169,942 licenses were issued by the Authority for Goods Carrying Vehicles (GCV) reflecting an increase of 18.8 percent as compared to 143,011 licenses issued during the FY 2021/22. Licenses issued for GCV contributed to about 59.8 percent of the total issued licenses during the reporting period as summarized in Table 2.


3.2.1. Licenses Issued to Goods Carrying Vehicles per Capacity


It was noted during the reporting period that, 32.6 percent of the GCV issued licenses were of carrying capacity between 6 and 10 tons. The second largest category with 31.6 percent of total were large trucks with carrying capacity of 31 tons and above. The smallest share of licenses were issued to goods vehicles with carrying capacity between 26 and 30 tons at 0.4 percent of total licenses issued to goods-carrying vehicles. More details are provided in Table 7 and Figure 6.

3.2.2 Licenses Issued to PSV per Zone

During the period under review, number of licenses issued to the Eastern Zone, Lake Zone, Northern Zone and Southern Zone recorded growths of 23.1 percent, 15.0 percent, 7.3 percent and 28.7 percent respectively, whilst in Central Zone they declined by 23.5 percent. Table 8 details of issued licenses for goods-carrying vehicles in financial 2021/2022 and 2022/2023.

Further, Figure 7 illustrates the distribution of issued GCV licenses by geographical zones. Data analysis s showed/revealed that the largest share (55.0 percent) of Goods Carrying Vehicles were issued in the Eastern zone, followed by Northern zone at 15 percent, 13 percent in Southern Zone, 12 percent in the Lake Zone and 5 percent in the Central zone of Tanzania.

It was also revealed that 70 percent of all GCV licenses were issued in Eastern and Northern zone. In addition, Data analysis on issued license statistics show concentration of issued GCV in one regional office within some of the geographical zones, whereby Dar-es-Salaam issued 57 percent of all Eastern zone issued licenses. The corresponding shares for other zones were 57 percent at Dodoma (Central) and 43 percent at Arusha office in Northern zone. In other zones, the concentration was in two regional offices such as at Ruvuma (26 percent) and Mbeya offices (23 percent) in Southern zone while for Lake zone; Mwanza and Shinyanga alone contributed 32 percent and 30 percent of all issued GCV licenses.

3.3. Issued Licenses for Private Hire Services

During the period under review, The Authority issued a total of 63,995 licenses to Private Hire Vehicles. This achievement was a growth of 29.6 percent compared to 49,395 licenses issued in the financial year 2021/2022. Private Hire Services include Motor Cycles (D1), Motor Tricycles (D2), Taxi Cabs (D3), Ride Hailing (D4) and- Special Hire (D6). During the FY 2022/23, a total of 63,995 licenses were issued by the Authority for Private Hire Vehicles reflecting an increase of 29.6 percent as compared to 49,395 licenses issued during the FY 2021/22. Licenses issued for Private Hire Vehicles contributed about 22.5 percent of the total issued licenses during the reporting period as summarized in Table 9.

Further analysis revealed that Licenses issued to motorcycles in the reporting period recorded the highest market share of 50 percent among total issued licenses in Private hire vehicle category, followed by motor tricycles at 40 percent as summarized in Table 9. It is important to note that during the reporting period, the Authority commenced issuing a new product licenses category – Special Hire.

3.3.1. Motorcycles - Private Hire Licenses

Motorcycles are two-wheeled motor-driven vehicles intended or adapted for use in the provision of private hire service on roads. Motorcycles are licensed under regulation 4 of the Land Transport Regulatory Authority (Private Hire Services) Regulations, GN 78 of 2020. These Regulations shall apply in relation to Public Hire Vehicles with carrying capacity of below fifteen passengers and shall include motorcycles and motor tricycles.

i) Licenses Issued to Motorcycles (D1)

The Authority issued a total of 31,937 licenses (D1) for motorcycles during the reported period, being an increment of 38.0 percent compared to a total number 23,151 licenses issued during the similar period of the financial year 2021/2022. The licenses issued for motorcycles contributed about 50 percent of the total issued licenses for private hire vehicles as summarized in Table 9.

ii) Licenses Issued to Motorcycles by Zone

The Authority issued a total of 31,937 licenses (D1) for motorcycles during the reported period, being an increment of 38.0 percent compared to a total number 23,151 licenses issued during the similar period of the financial year 2021/2022. The licenses issued for motorcycles contributed about 50 percent of the total issued licenses for private hire vehicles as summarized in Table 9.



3.3.2. Issued Licenses for Motor Tricycles -Private Hire Services

Motor Tricycles are three-wheeled motor-driven vehicles intended or adapted for use in the provision of private hire service on roads. Motor Tricycles are licensed under Regulation 4 of the Land Transport Regulatory Authority (Private Hire Services) Regulations, GN 78 of 2020. These Regulations apply in relation to Public Hire Vehicles with carrying capacity of below fifteen passengers and shall include motorcycles and motor tricycles.

During the period under review the Authority issued a total of 25,512 Licenses (D2) for motor tricycles, recording an increase of 24.0 percent compared to a total of 20,577 licenses issued in the similar period of FY 2021/2022. Licenses issued to tricycles contribute about 40.0 percent of the total private hire licenses during the period under review as summarized in Table 9.

3.3.3. Issued Licenses for Taxi Cabs Services

Taxi cabs are motor vehicles licensed to transport passengers not exceeding eight persons including the driver in return for a payment of a fare. Taxi cabs are licensed under regulation 4 of the Land Transport Regulatory Authority (Private Hire Services) Regulations, GN 78 of 2020. They are commercial vehicle for private hire purposes.


In the reporting period, the Authority issued 2,305 licenses for taxi cabs service, recording a decline of 13.1 percent when compared to a total of 2,654 licenses issued in a similar period of the previous financial year. Table 9 shows the share of licenses issued to taxi cabs is 3.6 percent of the total private hire service licenses that were issued during the reporting period.

3.3.4. Issued Licenses for Ride Hailing Services (D4)

Ride-hailing services are motor vehicles providing services through a ride hailing platform for the purpose of providing private hire services. Ride Hailing are licensed under Regulation 4 of the Land Transport Regulatory Authority (Private Hire Services) Regulations, GN 78 of 2020. They are commercial vehicle for private hire purposes.

During the Financial Year 2022/2023, the Authority issued a total of 3,523 licenses for ride hailing taxi services, recording an increase of 16.9 percent when compared to a total of 3,013 licenses issued in the similar period of the last financial year. Licenses issued to ride hailing taxi services contributed 5.5 percent of the total private hire service licenses issued during the reporting period.

3.3.5. Special Hire Services (D6)

It was worth noting that, the Authority started issuance of Special Hire Vehicles in FY 2022/23. In the said period, the Authority issued a total of 718 licenses for Special Hire services. Special Hire Services contributed 1.1 percent of the issued Private Hire service licenses as summarized in Table 9.

4..0 DRIVERS REGISTRATION AND CERTIFICATION

Driver's registration and certification is guided by regulation 4(1) of the Land Transport Regulatory Authority (Certification of Commercial Vehicle Drivers and Registration of Crew) Regulation, GN. 81 of 2020. The Authority is implementing registration of the drivers for the purpose of certifying their competence, skills and knowledge to enhance road safety and reduce accidents.

4.1. Registration of Drivers

During the period under review, a total of 6,806 drivers were registered, showing an increase of 66.4 percent compared to 4,089 drivers registered in the financial year 2021/2022.

4.2. Examination and Certification of Drivers

In the reporting period, 1,704 drivers were examined, out of the examined drivers, 1,029 drivers, equivalent to 60.4 percent passed the exam and were certified while the remaining 576

driver's equivalent to 39.6 percent failed. Table 12 and Figure 10 provides number of examined and certified drivers during the period under review.

It is worth noting that driver examination and certification begun in the FY the above FY 2021/2022 at a slower pace. During that period the Authority had only a single examination centre in Dar es Salaam. However, in the FY 2022/23 the Authority opened more examination centres in other regions such as Mbeya and Dodoma. Therefore huge variation in number of examined drivers between FY 2022/23 and FY 2021/22 was attributed by the above factor.

5.0. VEHICLE TRACKING SYSTEM

The Land Transport Authority, Regulation 51 of the Transport Licensing (Public Service Vehicles) Regulation of 2020, stipulates the general provisions of a service provider on their duty to install and maintain vehicle tracking device and report any malfunctions of the device within 24 hours.

Moreover, Regulation 24 (a) of the Transport Licensing (Public Service Vehicles) Regulation of 2020, entails, one of the conditions of a license for inter- city or inter-national public service vehicle is a vehicle that is fitted with a vehicle tracking device (VTS) that is authorized by the Authority. The purpose of installing vehicle tracking devices is to monitor speed of vehicles along the journey; increase compliance of drivers and reducing road accidents.

The term **"Activated"** means vehicles with a functioning/ active vehicle tracking device, and "Deactivated" means vehicles with a non-active vehicle tracking device, or reported to be non-operating.

During the financial year 2022/2023, a cumulative of 2,216 buses were connected to the Vehicle Tracking System (VTS) indicating a growth of 33.3 percent in comparison with 2021/2022. Cumulatively at the end of June 2023, a total number of 9,913 vehicles were fitted with VTDs, whereby an average of 7,900 vehicles were actively remitting data to the VTS. On a daily average, 63 per cent were actively on the road during the period. The remaining 37 per cent of the vehicles were reported to be parked, grounded or under maintenance.


